Dear Maverick Families,

Congratulations! We have now officially survived the first month of the school year! It's always busy and exhausting to start a new year but this year has provided some additional challenges for us to navigate: road construction, a bus driver shortage, and all the fun and excitement of homecoming. The football game didn't end how we'd like it to on homecoming but the rest of the week was a great way to close out the month of September. I even think the chili was especially tasty this year.

There will be no shortage of activities and events during the month of October. Our elementary students are selling chocolate bars that help fund things like field trips. Our volleyball, football, and cross country teams will continue their seasons with games and meets at or close to home. Our high school students will be out in the community doing service projects during MCW Gives Back day.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Regular School Attendance at school helps to:

Reduce stress through providing regular structure for students and families.

Social Emotional support making it easier to connect with friends and teachers.

Student Achievement and success in later life.

We are working to make the environment at Trimont Elementary a place where everyone feels welcome and supported. We will do our best to listen and partner with you so that our children have a successful year. Let's work together to:

Keep Healthy – Make sure students get adequate sleep, eat well and exercise.

Keep Connected –Be sure to call the school office if your child is unable to come to school due to illness. If you are not certain whether to send your child to school due to illness, call Nurse Megan Morgan to discuss the situation.

Keep Learning – If your child has to stay home due to illness, contact your child's teacher to develop a plan for learning at home and making up missing work.

<u>Cell Phones "Away for the Day"</u> To help maintain a focused and respectful learning environment at Trimont Elementary, students are encouraged not to bring cell phones or other electronic devices including smart watches, and earbuds/air pods to school. If students choose to bring these items to school they will need to remain in student backpacks/lockers during the academic school day, including morning recess and lunch. Students who need to be in contact with their family during the academic day are to ask permission to use one of our school phones. Parents are welcome and encouraged to contact our main office if there is a message that needs to be relayed.

National School Bus Safety Month

October is National School Bus Safety month, a time to emphasize the importance of safety for our children as they travel to and from school. The school bus is one of the safest modes of transportation, but we all play a role in ensuring that it remains that way. Here are some important reminders to keep our students safe:

Be Visible: Encourage your children to stand at least 6 feet away from the curb while waiting for the bus. Wearing bright or reflective clothing can also help them be seen.

Stay Alert: Remind students to stay focused and avoid distractions like phones or headphones while waiting for the bus or crossing the street.

Follow the Rules: Reinforce the importance of following the bus driver's instructions and remaining seated while the bus is in motion.

Use Caution When Boarding and Exiting: Children should wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before getting on or off. If they need to cross the street, they should always look both ways and wait for the driver's signal.

Talk About Safety: Have open discussions with your children about the importance of bus safety and the rules they need to follow.

Character Trait - Responsibility

This month we are talking about
Responsibility. One way to define
Responsibility is "taking action and
understanding the impact of our choices."

Taking action can mean doing the right thing
or completing the tasks you have been
assigned. Understanding the impact of our
choices means that our actions matter.
Positive and responsible actions can help
people and irresponsible actions can hurt
others.

Pursuit #3

We have all demonstrated Responsibility in our lives. Many of us have seen people practice Responsibility in ways that have inspired us. Stories are powerful tools for connecting as a family. Protect time this week to share stories about Responsibility with each other (you can use the story prompts to get started). At the end of the conversation, think of 1 way you can practice Responsibility this week.

Pursuit #1

As a family, think of ways in which you might make someone's life a little easier by helping a neighbor or family friend with 1 of their Responsibilities.

Could you bring the garbage to the chute or out to the curb? Could you carry things in from the grocery store? Could you invite someone over for a meal or a show?

Pursuit #2

Review Responsibility as a family!
Responsibility is taking action and understanding how our choices affect others. Choose I household chore (or more!) that requires multiple steps. Then have each member of the family select I step to complete to help get the job done! Maybe it is washing the dishes, doing laundry, cleaning the living room, or unloading the groceries – whatever it is, see who can be the quickest or most effective at their task!

Story Prompts:

A time I (or someone else) showed Responsibility was ____.

An act of Responsibility that changed/challenged me was ___.

Attendance

Did you know that absenteeism in the first month of school can predict poor attendance throughout the school year. Half the students who miss 2-4 days in September go on to miss nearly a month of school. In addition, a student's attendance directly correlates with their ability to read proficiently (source Attendance Works). Please be an advocate for your students' school attendance; if students are healthy send them to school! When not possible due to illness, please be sure to let the office staff know that your child will be absent, needs to leave school early, or will be late to school. It is very important that we keep accurate records of attendance.

Bus Safety

Appropriate behavior on the bus is an important part of the school day for many of our students. The ride to and from school can have a big effect on a child's ability to focus during the school day.

Transportation to and from school is a privilege, therefore students are expected to follow the behavioral expectations on the bus. These expectations are in place to ensure the safety of students while in transit and preserve a child's readiness to learn.

- Follow driver directions and obey all laws and safety rules for your bus
- Place trash in receptacles
- Use positive tone, volume and language while on the bus
- Stay in your seat facing forward keeping hands
 & feet to self
- Report suspicious/dangerous behavior and acts of bullying
- Be on Time


