Dear Maverick Families.

February is School Board appreciation month in Minnesota. This month is designed to recognize the contributions that school board members make to their communities across the state. We at Martin County West Schools join school districts throughout Minnesota in saluting our local education leaders this month.

As a community, we elect school board members to govern our public education system. In these roles, they oversee multimillion dollar budgets which fund our school programs for more than 893,000 students in approximately 2,000 schools. Their personnel decisions affect more than 58,000 teachers and thousands of administrators and support workers. Locally, our MCW school board members have responsibility for a budget of over \$10 million dollars collected from taxpayers for the education of around 700 students in preschool to grade 12 by approximately 130 employees.

School board members are volunteer leaders responsible for adopting school district policy, approving curriculum, maintaining school facilities, and adhering to state and federal education law. Legal concerns and the complexities of school

finance, including budgeting and taxation, require them to spend many hours in board training programs and personal study to enhance their understanding of these issues.

As a staff person and parent, I have deep appreciation for the dedicated men and women who serve on our MCW school board. They have important decisions to make where the answers are not easy. Their willingness to wrestle with the issues before them and make the choices that are best for our students, staff, and community is a benefit to all of us.





Why do we test? What does it mean?

We are now at our mid-year testing mark in Sherburn and Trimont Elementary. You might wonder why we FastBridge test students three times a year? This data helps us know where kids start the year, how they are progressing, and where they end the year. Thankfully these tests don't take a long time to complete.

This data is also very important for our intervention groups. The data tells us exactly what students need to work on in small groups and how to monitor to make sure students make progress to be ready for their next grade!

In Trimont, we take three tests. One test measures fluency, one measures comprehension, and one measures the overall reading skills.

In Sherburn, we take two tests but we get more detailed information. Information can be broken down into these categories: fluency, letter sounds, letter names, nonsense words, segmenting words, concept of print, beginning sounds, sight words and sentence reading.

These are just some of the benefits of simply walking. The faster, farther and more frequent you walk, increase the benefits of your walking. You can start out slow and short walks. One lap around our school is a good place to start. Then move on to walking your lap faster, perhaps you need a period of strolling in your lap. That's okay too! Practice your walking posture and purposeful movements. There are things you can do to help you stay motivated in your walking. Ask a friend to join you. Start with a simple goal, like "I will walk for 10 minutes." Then work on increasing that goal. Maybe listen to music and walk to the beat. Vary your routine; walk fast for a few minutes then slow down. Walking is free when school is in session at Sherburn Elementary and High School and Trimont Elementary.

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What is Early Childhood Family Education?

Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE) is a program for all Minnesota families with children between the ages of birth and Kindergarten enrollment. It recognizes that families provide children's first and most important learning environments and parents are children's first and most significant teachers. It is the mission of Early Childhood Family Education to strengthen families and support the ability of all parents to provide the best possible environment for the healthy growth and development of children.

Who participates?

All children ages birth to Kindergarten enrollment and their parents in the Martin County West School District are eligible to participate. This program is not only for income eligible families, but for everyone.

District 2448 Early Childhood Screening at Sherburn Elementary March 1, 2024

Minnesota state law requires that every child has a developmental screening <u>before entering kindergarten</u>. Screening is done for children between the ages of 3 years 8 months through kindergarten entrance.

THIS SCREENING IS FREE OF CHARGE

Areas in which your child will be screened include: vision, hearing, growth, immunization status and skills in thinking, communication, motor skills and social/emotional development.

If you know of a new family to our district that has not been in contact with MCW CER about Early Childhood Screening, please share this information with them.

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Volunteers Needed

Martin County West CER programs depend on the support of our community. Volunteers are ALWAYS needed to give the gift of their time to help build experiences for the members of community, especially the youth. Nearly 40 children, 1st through 3rd grade, signed up for our FUNdamenetal Basketball Program! We were able to run this program because of volunteers. We need more of this kind of dedication to offer programming to our young people. Open gym requires someone to open the building, ensure the equipment is functional and ready for use, and supervise the days activities, then put it all





away and ensure the facility is returned to proper order for the next event or school day.

Last year, over 150 young people in our community signed up to play summer ball. Over 150 kids spent time outdoors, learning skills like how their bodies move, teamwork, leadership, and responsibility. These kids spent time with their friends, talking to each other. They built relationships with others they had the opportunity to spend time with. These things cannot happen without volunteers.

MCW also has a few paid positions. The Summer Ball Coordinator earns a stipend of nearly \$4000. Planning starts soon for Summer Ball and we need someone to fill this position. What happens if no one accepts this role? Will we have enough help to safely provide these programs to our community members, of all ages. MCW CER is looking for Certified Lifeguards, Yoga Instructor, Water Safety Instructors, Summer Ball Coordinators. These are paid positions. There are many opportunities to volunteer. We Want to Help You Keep Your Health Insurance

Like all states, Minnesota maintained health care coverage for its Medicaid (called "Medical Assistance" in Minnesota) enrollees during the COVID-19 pandemic. Since March 2020, members stayed enrolled regardless of most life changes that previously would have affected their coverage.

In spring 2023, states returned to standard eligibility procedures. The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) has resumed the renewal process for the 1.5 million Minnesotans enrolled in public health care programs.

DHS is working to make sure all eligible Minnesotans keep their health insurance. If you have Medical Assistance or MinnesotaCare, here's what you can do:



Watch for the circle in blue when it's time to renew

Watch for an envelope marked "Important information enclosed" with your renewal paperwork. Make sure you return it on time. mn.gov/dhs/renewmycoverage/next-steps



Report address and phone number changes

If you have moved in the past three years, call your county or tribal agency to make updates to your contact information so we can reach you.



Look up when your renewal takes place

Know when to watch your mailbox for your renewal information using the renewal lookup tool at mnrenewallookup.com



Get text messages when you need to take action

DHS is sending one-way text messages from 28343 for those enrolled in Medical Assistance, MinnesotaCare, the Minnesota Family Planning Program and Medicare Savings Programs.



Upload your completed renewal documents online

You can now submit your renewal application by uploading scans or photos of your paperwork. Detailed instructions are available at mn.gov/dhs/renewmycoverage/uploads/
