Dear Maverick Families,

Last month in this space I shared how proud I am of all the hard work our elementary and English teachers are putting in as they learn about the science of reading. This month, I want to share the impressive work our high school and specialist teachers are doing in the area of technology.

Last summer, a group of staff at the junior/senior high school developed an implementation plan for a one to one device initiative where each of our high school students were issued a district iPad to use for school work, both in the classroom and for homework and studying. Thanks to a grant from the Federal Communications Commission, the school district had enough iPads on hand to do this. We had a management system to ensure those iPads were used safely and appropriately. We had a new Technology Assistant to prepare the iPads and the management system, coordinate distribution and use of devices, and to troubleshoot issues as they arise. Perhaps most importantly, we had time to provide our teachers with training on how best to embed the use of technology into their classrooms. While our elementary and English teachers are learning about the science of reading, our high school and specialist teachers are learning about technology in the classroom.

Our secondary teachers have been studying the SAMR model of technology integration into the classroom. This model was developed by Dr. Ruben Puentedura. SAMR stands for <u>Substitution</u>, Augmentation, Modification, and Redefinition.

Substitution means that we use technology tools in place of other tools. For instance, we type on a document rather than writing on paper.

Augmentation is similar to substitution but it expands or improves on it. Now instead of just typing in a

document instead of writing on paper, maybe a student adds a photo or a video to their document. Both substitution and augmentation use technology to enhance what students can do in the classroom.

Modification and redefinition use technology to transform what students do or experience in the classroom. Modification means that technology changes how things work. For example, using Google Classroom to post and collect assignments rather than a paper syllabus and box for turning in paper assignments. Redefinition means students use technology to do things they could not have previously done. For instance, using virtual reality headsets to take a field trip to the pyramids of Giza or the Great Wall of China and then creating a Google Slides presentation with embedded photos and videos to share what they learned with their classmates.

These are very simple examples of what our teachers are studying as they explore the new options for teaching our students using technology but they mark an important step forward for our district. Using technology will be expected in nearly every professional and many social settings now and into the future. The technology experiences our teachers are providing students is invaluable as they graduate into life in the 21st century. It is exciting to watch it unfold in our classrooms!

<u>March's Monthly Theme</u> - Our *Character Strong* curriculum in March will focus on **Cooperation**. Cooperation is "working together to reach shared goals." Throughout the school, students will be developing skills like perspective-taking, conflict resolution and leadership.

Spring MCA Assessments —Students will be taking the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments during April. These assessments are required by the state of Minnesota and help our district ensure that our curriculum meets the state standards. They also help teachers plan for instruction and learning and allow us to measure student performance against the state standard. These assessment results are used to help determine if students are mastering key content knowledge and attaining the skills necessary to be successful at the next level. The testing calendar is posted to the District website under "Parent Links". Please try to avoid having your child miss school during their scheduled testing dates. We will make efforts to allow time to make up missed tests on the make-up dates scheduled, but that may mean they miss out of other activities scheduled for those days.

Flutter In to ECFE


Martin County West families with children ages birth to Pre-kindergarten are invited to join us for Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE). Flutter on in to celebrate spring

An Update from the Red Bulls Youth Wrestling Program

So far, the Red Bull Youth Wrestlers are having another great year. We had 107 total kids signed up this year and as of today have competed in a total of over 800 matches between all the kids. Not every kid goes to the tournaments and that's alright too. We encourage our parents to let the kids do those things at their own pace. Some kids want to do them all the time and some kids want to only do a few or none and just have fun at practice. Wrestling is different than most youth sports we offer because it is really an individual sport first. It takes a lot of courage to walk out on the mat by yourself and wrestle another boy or girl. Speaking of girls, we have 14 girls signed up in our youth program this year. Women's wrestling is currently the fastest growing sport in High School across the country right now and we hope to help that continue. Last year we had one of our Girls place 2nd at the MN USA State tournament. We also had a 2nd Place finisher at MN USA for the boys. At the NY-WA State Tournament, we had a 3rd and a 4th place finisher on the main side of the tournament and a 2nd place finisher on the Invite side of the tournament. All 5 of those wrestlers are returning this year and next year to our youth program so

we hope to see big things out of them in the next few years. We encourage all kids to give wrestling a try, it truly is a sport where there is a place for everyone no matter what your weight, height, or gender there is a place for you.



- Official FFA tie or official FFA scarf

Special notes:

- No white t-shirts will be allowed
- If skirts are worn, they must be of knee length at a minimum
- No black capris, yoga pants, leggings, athletic pants, etc are allowed.
- Students are not allowed on stage with incorrect official dress.
- Students that do not have Official Dress that meets the standards outlined above will have to purchase the correct official dress at their own expense before being allowed to attend/compete in events.
