Dear Maverick Families,

On Election Day this year, 1,772 residents of the Martin County West School District went to the polls to vote on the proposal for a new school building. This is a 65.4% turnout for voters in a special election just about the future of our school buildings. This is astonishing and well beyond all the projections for turnout based on previous school district elections. Thank you to each one of you who took the time to exercise your right to vote! No matter how you voted, your time and effort to share your opinion on the future of our school district is appreciated.

When all votes were counted, the proposal was not approved by voters. Just 50 more people voted no than voted yes. Over the next weeks, the school board will sift through the data we gathered to determine what such a close margin means and how we proceed now as a school district. All the issues with our budget and the conditions and adequacy of our school buildings still exist so we must find solutions for our current and future Maverick students, staff, and community.

What impressed me about the days leading up to the election was the passion for and commitment to our school district community. There are so many people in this community who love living here and are proud to be Mavericks. People may have disagreed about what the best pathway forward was and that

is perfectly normal. Good people can learn the facts and draw different conclusions. The task for the school district is still to find the plan forward that a majority of people can support.

No one knows yet what that best plan forward is. There are lots of different options, ideas, and opinions out there right now for school board members to think about as we regroup. I am confident there will be opportunities for everyone to give input as planning what comes next progresses.

I woke up the day after the election and thought "We're all still Mavericks." I walked through all our schools and talked with many students and staff that day. There were many different feelings but the main one I sensed amongst our staff was a determination to keep doing their part to carry out the MCW mission to "provide an engaging education that nurtures learners who are confident critical thinkers prepared to contribute to an everchanging world." We are all still rock-solid in our commitment to our students and our desire to provide them with the best possible education. That is a very solid foundation on which to build our future together.

We are excited to tell you that we will be using a program called **PurposeFull People** this year. This program teaches skills that will help students be successful in school and in life.

We believe that students should have safe, predictable places to learn where they feel included. Students should have healthy and helpful connections with teachers and classmates. They should also experience learning that will help them tackle challenges inside and outside of school. *PurposeFull People* is more than a set of lessons - it is a partnership between schools and families to create a place where students feel like they belong and learn skills that will help them be the best they can be!

Purposefull People has three main goals for students: Be Kind, Be Strong, and Be Well.

- Be Kind: Social skills like listening, friendship, solving conflicts, and leadership. These skills are taught alongside Empathy, Respect, & Cooperation
- Be Strong: Skills that help students focus, stay organized, and set goals. These skills are taught alongside Responsibility, Courage, & Perseverance
- Be Well: Skills that help students handle their emotions and deal with stress. O These skills are taught alongside *Gratitude*, *Honesty*, & *Creativity*

TIPS!

Reading at home is very important! Here are some guidelines to help be successful when reading at home with your child!

- Sit next to your child! This allows your child to know you are present with them.
- Make it part of the routine at home. Take 15-20 minutes to read out loud together each night!
- 3. Have your child read out loud. Reading out loud improves fluency!
- 4. Setting aside the technology and read together! Your kids will love that bonding time together!
- 5. Ask them questions along the way.

 the story?" "Who are the main
 characters?" "Was there a problem
 in the story, how did they solve

Did you know??

When your student reads 20 minutes outside of the school day they are gaining 3,600 minutes per school year. They read 1,800,000 words per year!

Reading out loud can be an extremely tough skill to complete as school age kiddo, however reading out loud and fluency are directly related! Have your kiddo read to you vs by themself!
