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# Summer Reminders

- Please call the Central Office at 764-2330 if your *contact information changes* over the summer. This includes your physical address, mailing address, phone numbers, email address, etc.
- If you have a *new family* in your neighborhood, please encourage them to contact the Central Office at 764-2330 to get set up to receive back to school information
- MCW School Offices will reopen starting **Monday, August 5th**, from 7:30am to 4:00pm. If you need assistance before then, contact the Central Office.
- Conferences for grades K-6 will be held September 5th & 6th. Your student must be registered online to sign up for a conference time.



## 2023-2024 Registration

- Registration will be completely **ONLINE** for the 2024-2025 school year, starting August 14. No paper forms will be accepted.
- Registration works best on a tablet or desktop computer. If you do not have access to the appropriate technology or internet, you may register in person at any MCW school building, and there will be technology available there.
- If you do not provide a **PHYSICAL** address (**NOT** a Post Office Box), your registration will not be allowed to be completed until that information is provided.
- You must register your elementary age child(ren) before you can schedule a conference time with their teacher.
- If your child requires any of the following forms, the **parent/guardian** is responsible for getting those signed, health office staff will not be faxing forms to medical providers. These forms are available as fillable forms on the school website: [martin.k12.mn.us/Page/76](http://martin.k12.mn.us/Page/76)
  - Prescription Medication Administration
  - Special Diet Statement
  - Asthma Action Plan

It is preferred that you upload these forms when completing registration, however physical copies can be turned into the office.

- School fees can be paid on SchoolPay or in person. This includes:
  - Class dues for grades 9-12
  - Sports/Activity Fees
  - Milk break
  - Carryover lunch balances from previous years
- Please complete the Application for Educational Benefits, even if you do not believe you need the benefits, or don't think you'd qualify. Our percentage of qualifying students affects our standing in the MSHSL, and is an important factor in many federal and state programs.
- All students participating in MSHSL Sports/Activities (Speech, Robotics, etc) **MUST** attend the MSHSL meeting, or arrange with Mr. Elliott to get the information and turn in the required form(s) prior to participating in the activity.

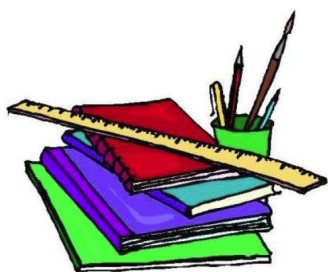
